WHAT IS CHRONIC ABSENTEEISM?

Chronic absenteeism (CA) is a problem impacting students and school districts across the United States. CA is defined as 10% of total hours absent with or without legitimate excuse within a single academic year.¹

Across the nation, there were 14.7 million (29.7%) chronically absent students in the '21-'22 academic year. Across Ohio, there were 473,233 chronically absent students during the '21-'22 academic year.²



WHAT LEADS TO CHRONIC ABSENTEEISM?

There are many different causes of CA, but primary issues include:³

Barriers to attendance such as chronic illness, poor transportation options, or inequitable access to needed services.

Aversion to school due to academic challenges, unwelcoming school environments, or social challenges.

Disengagement from school in response to poor relationships with teachers, a lack of enrichment opportunities, or a lack of academic and behavioral support.

Misconceptions about the impacts of absences, such as: "absences are only a problem if they are unexcused."

EFFECTS OF CHRONIC ABSENTEEISM

Chronic absenteeism is associated with: 4

- poorer academic outcomes
- an increased likelihood of dropping out of school
- adverse health outcomes
- · poverty in adulthood
- increased likelihood of interaction with the criminal justice system

QUICK STATS

Across Summit County public school districts, **28% of students** were chronically absent during the '22-'23 academic year.


This 28% represents nearly **18,000** students across the county







WHO IS CHRONICALLY ABSENT?




Students from marginalized backgrounds are at higher risk for CA.


Of all chronically absent students, 74% are experiencing economic disadvantage Of students who are experiencing homelessness, 60% are chronically absent

Of students who have an identified disability, 39% are chronically absent

WHAT CAN WE DO?

Attendance Works offers a tiered system for identifying children's needs as well as identifying the respective supports and interventions necessary for each tier. This tiered approach follows a pyramid-like system where those students at the top are in need of higher cost, individualized support, while those at the bottom receive low cost, universal support. These approaches, matched with ODE's attendance categories guide the recommendations listed below.

CHRONIC ABSENCE: MISSING 10% FOR ANY REASON (12 HOURS [2 DAYS]
PER MONTH OR 92 HOURS [18 DAYS] PER YEAR)

TIER 3: STUDENTS MISSING 20% OR MORE FOR ANY REASON

INTENSIVE INTERVENTION

EXTERNAL SUPPORT FOR HOUSING, HEALTH, OR CASE MANAGEMENT TAILORED TO THE NEEDS OF THE STUDENT OR FAMILY, IN ADDITION TO WITHIN-SCHOOL ASSISTANCE

TIER 2: STUDENTS MISSING 10-19% FOR ANY REASON

EARLY INTERVENTION

FAMILY VISITS, INDIVIDUALIZED STUDENT SUCCESS PLANS, SMALL GROUP INTERVENTIONS, INTENSIVE TUTORING, AND MENTORSHIP

TIER 1: ALL STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

UNIVERSAL SUPPORTS

RECOGNITION OF IMPROVED ATTENDANCE, CONNECTION TO CARING ADULTS IN THE SCHOOL, PERSONALIZED COMMUNICATION WITH THE FAMILY, AND CLEAR AND CONSISTENT COMMUNICATION ABOUT THE SCHOOL SCHEDULE
